Read the text below carefully:

"Decebalus was the king of Dacians (a kingdom partially located on nowadays Romanian territory. He ruled between 87-106. As a king he led Dacia to an increasing economical and cultural prosperity. He fought against Trajanus and the Roman Empire 101-102 și 105-106) and he was eventually defeated in 106. He commited suicide to avoid being captured. Dacia became a Roman province.

Along with the Romans the Dacians are the ancestors of the Romanians. More than 200 Romanian words are of Dacian origins."
